Thanks to Aaron Contracting's support, 2024 was a wonderful year for engaging Metro Detroit residents in hands-on action and education to create a better Rouge River.

Friends of the Rouge (FOTR) continued to expand engagement with community with a record reach of 20,000+ local residents and community partners. It was a year of leadership transition and FOTR was thrilled to name Ashley Flintoff as the new Executive Director. Ashley brings 11 years of experience at Wayne State—most recently as the Director of Planning and Space Management—and an exuberance to strategically grow the organization to meet the evolving needs of the community and Rouge River.

New in 2025, FOTR begins the strategic planning process, paused during the leadership transition, to grow on strengths and leverage its budget of \$12.7M and a staff of 18 to better serve the mission.

Reasons to cheer in 2024 included:

- 824 Rouge River outreach, action & education events
- 8,245 hours of river and environmental education provided
- \$667K to combat climate change with green infrastructure solutions in the City of Dearborn
- completion of the most comprehensive salt study for the Rouge River system
- \$5.4M in funding to support new trails along the Lower Rouge River
- juvenile redside dace (endangered fish) sighted by FOTR fish team in Johnson Creek











#### New Website Launched!

In 2024, the FOTR website metrics returned to 2022 levels. Users reached 61,900—a growth of 30% over 5 years. Sessions increased to 84,567—a growth of 26% over the same period. **New in 2025—the launch of the redesigned website, www.therouge.org**. The new site was designed to optimize usability, enhance aesthetics, lower bounce rates, and provide clearer calls to action!



Your logo belongs in the "Rouge Rundown"! The average number subscribers for FOTR's bi-weekly newsletter grew to 9,164 in 2024 and by 32% over the 5 year period shown in the graph below. Likewise, the average Rouge Rundown open rate increased to 39% in 2024-and more than doubled from 17% in 2020. The e-news remains FOTR's most effective tool to engage Friends in action.

# Rouge River Watershed Report

The Rouge River has come a long way from the nearly lifeless river it was in the 1980's. With great successes to celebrate, there is still vital work to be done to realize the vision of a clean and vibrant hometown Rouge River. Released in 2024, the Rouge River Watershed Report Card, created by the University of Maryland Center for **Environmental Sciences in partnership with** FOTR and funded by the Erb Family Foundation, gave the watershed an overall grade of D+. This grade was determined by data across 33 indicators in water, economy, recreation. infrastructure, human health and ecosystems. Bird Diversity ranked as the watershed's only A Impervious Surfaces, (very good). Overflows, and Flooding received some of the watershed's F grades (very poor).





Image: Grades for multiple indicators, from the University of Maryland Center for Environmental Sciences' Rouge River Watershed report card.

#### Engaging Community via Social Media

FOTR leveraged social media to share event information, fun memes with a Rouge River twist, news stories, event recaps, impact stories, fundraisers, River facts, and sponsor recognition.

**FOTR** "followers" grew on Instagram and Facebook. The largest social media audience continues to engage via Facebook—with 16,220 followers, an estimated 57% of whom are age 55 and older. Over five years, the number of Facebook followers has grown by 28%. Over the same period, the number of Instagram followers has grown by 254%, with 2,128 Instagram followers in 2024. Instagram captures a younger demographic—62% of whom are between the ages of 25-44. Combined, these platforms reach a broad audience of Friends.

# Impact Spotlight: New Trail Realizes Vision of Rouge Connection

2024 heralded big wins for Rouge River access and connectivity. Most notably, the **Rouge Gateway Greenway has been revitalized.** FOTR will lead the construction of a 1.9 mile asphalt trail, including two pedestrian bridges, to connect The Henry Ford and UM Dearborn **thanks to \$4.6M from Wayne County Economic Development and \$2.7M from the Ralph C. Wilson Jr., Foundation**. In partnership with The Henry Ford, Ford Land, City of Dearborn, UM Dearborn, Wayne County Parks, and Friends of the Detroit River, this project realizes a trail last iterated in the 2005 Rouge Gateway Greenway Masterplan—and a decades old community dream.
